One of the successes which has delighted me the most has been the resurgence of the Light Blues Club under the leadership of Lee Wilson, Ed Williams, Adrian Peters and Tony Orfeo, supported by Jon West our Provincial Mentor. # THE MASONIC ORDER OF ATHELSTAN

Some 10 years ago, when Cambridge Mason Alex Allan stood down as the Director of Ceremonies of Nourse Lodge No. 8590, in order to pursue a greater knowledge and understanding of Freemasonry, little did he know where that journey would lead.

Ten years on he is now a Grand Officer in numerous Orders such as the Commemorative Order of St Thomas of Acon, Red Cross of Constantine, Royal and Select Masters, as well as the Masonic Order of Athelstan.

On the 28th September 2019, he was Invested as the Provincial Grand Master for East Anglia in the Masonic Order of Athelstan, at the Provincial Meeting in Bury St Edmunds. With two thriving Courts in Cambridgeshire, at Newmarket and Whittlesey, there has been a long-standing ambition, within the Provincial Executive, to introduce the Order into Cambridge, which is now coming to fruition.

The new Court, to be named the Keith Ansell Court at Grantebrycge, is planned to be consecrated by the Grand Master, at Bateman Street, Cambridge, on Saturday 31st October 2020 and will meet at Bateman Street on the third Friday in February, fourth Tuesday in May and second Tuesday in September. Unusually for a Masonic Order, founders of a Court do not have to already be members of the Order. ## ORIGINS OF THE ORDER

The roots of the Masonic Order of Athelstan are founded in East Anglia. The first recorded meeting of the Grand Court was held on the 22nd October 2005, in Newmarket.

That was the day when, not only did the Province of East Anglia come into existence, but also the Primus Court of the Order – units of the Order are called Courts. The Court of Ælfred No. 2 was consecrated. No '1' was retained for a Court to be founded in York, where legend relates that King Athelstan organised what was later described as the first Grand Lodge of England in 926AD.

The Order as a whole celebrates and commemorates this legend annually at York with a special ritual.

Prior to the constitution of the Province of East Anglia and in anticipation of that event, some 17 brethren had been nominated to make up the first teams of Grand Officers, Provincial Grand Masters, Provincial Officers, and Worshipful Brethren. These ceremonies took place between July and October 2005, some at the Newmarket Masonic Centre.

A number of prominent East Anglian freemasons, meeting locally, formed the original caucus of founders. Among these was RWBro. Keith Ansell, a powerhouse who was intimately involved in the conception, development and progression of the Order and became the first Provincial Grand Master of East Anglia and first Grand Chancellor of the Knights of the Scarlet Mantle. This appendant Order of the Masonic Order of Athelstan had been conceived to reward meritorious service by Athelstan brethren and now is known as the Ancient Masonic Order of Alfred the Great. Unfortunately, RWBro. Keith died in 2006. However, the seeds he and others sowed have grown beyond all expectation.

The first Grand Secretary was RWBro. David Buxton, who was eventually succeeded by RWBro. Paul Johnston, now the MW Grand Master.

Further Courts in the Province of East Anglia were consecrated between 2006-2012 in Lowestoft, King's Lynn, Ipswich, Luton, Diss and Whittlesey, this rapid expansion mirroring the growth of the Order itself.

In 2015, the MW Grand Master of the Order of Athelstan commissioned the first major review of our ritual. Charged to lead this initiative was RW & EmBro. Dr Chris Ansell, Keith's son and a founder of the Court of Ælfred. His efforts resulted in the ritual the Order uses today.

The Order has expanded both at home and abroad, there now being approximately 150 Courts around the world, and the Sovereign Grand Courts of India and Australia have been established. Now with around 4,000 members, the Order has gone from strength to strength.

## WHAT'S IT ABOUT?

The Order is based on the historic records of the life and the legend of King Athelstan, the first king of all the English. The ceremonial draws on the significance of the Ancient Charges in the development of speculative Freemasonry from Anglo Saxon times. Candidates are said to be "Instructed" into the Order, the ceremonial portraying the story of a Master Mason being summoned to York in 926AD at the behest of the king. The Order forms an interesting element of the masonic story from this early period.

In England and Wales, the Order is structured so that its Provinces, wherever possible, reflect and represent ancient kingdoms of the Anglo-Saxon period. Our Provinces do not therefore correlate directly with the English County divisions. The Athelstan Province of East Anglia includes areas of Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, Bedfordshire and Northamptonshire.

Membership of our Order is strictly Invitational, and members are expected to take a wide and committed interest in all aspects of freemasonry, particularly masonic history.

As a part of its ethos, the Order encourages and prompts its members into further personal study and research, to make daily advancements in masonic knowledge.

The Order is fully committed to supporting the United Grand Lodge of England and it is mandatory for candidates and members to maintain current subscribing membership of both Craft and Royal Arch Chapter Masonry in Lodges and Chapters recognised by the UGLE.

## PROVINCIAL DC TAKES CHAIR OF LODGE OF REGULARITY NO. 91

On the Installation Meeting of Lodge of Regularity No.91 on the 27th February 2020, our Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, WBro. Jonathan Lambert was Installed as its 245th Worshipful Master.

The meeting in Lodge Room No.3 at Great Queen Street was supported and enjoyed by a number of Cambridgeshire brethren, including the Provincial Grand Master, RWBro. William Dastur and Provincial Senior Grand Warden, WBro. K A 'Danny' Ellis.

The Lodge of Regularity No. 91 was established in 1755 and was named in 1768. In 1755 the lodge met at the Swan, New Street, Covent Garden, London, and the lodge now meets at Freemasons' Hall, Great Queen Street, London.

The Lodge of Regularity is one of the 19 lodges that have the privilege of nominating each year a member for appointment by the Grand Master as a Grand Steward and is therefore known as a Red Apron Lodge. Therefore, Jonathan will be invested as a Grand Steward at the Investitures meeting in April and can expect a busy year during his period of appointment.

Following the meeting the brethren and guests dined in Freemasons Hall in the vestibule in front of the Grand Temple.

## Assistance for Acorn Project

A local charity offering therapeutic help to children who have experienced trauma and stress received financial assistance from Alma Mater Lodge No. 1492.

The donation of £500, inclusive of matched funding from the City and University Masonic Charitable Trust, went to The Acorn Project and was made by WBro. Peter Sutton, treasurer of the Lodge, to Matt Edge, the charity's chief operating officer.

The charity offers therapeutic help to children and young persons, within the age range of five to 18, who have experienced trauma or stress generally within the family environment

These symptoms will show themselves when a child starts school and will be recognised by staff in the school who are specially trained. Absence from school, behavioural problems or general distress will indicate that the child is having problems within the family. This can be caused by domestic abuse and mental or physical cruelty.

The charity undertakes sessions, usually on school premises, working with the family to identify the cause of the trauma and improve the situation. The charity is seeing an increasing number of cases requiring help at ever earlier ages. Funding is a restriction on the number of families that can be helped. The cost of a year's work can be £900. The Alma Mater donation will be used to assist a family where a child is experiencing trauma or stress.

## New plan to retain members

As part of the Membership Pathway project, the Province will now conduct exit interviews with all those wishing to resign from a Lodge or the Craft.

VWBro. Pat Kilby, who heads the project, has asked WBro. Harry Rooke to institute a process to arrange an interview with those resigning from the Craft where appropriate.

The objectives are to gain an insight into the causes of resignation and, where possible, address these issues and retain the Mason either in his own Lodge, another Lodge in the Province, or facilitate his engagement with another Province.

A recent change to Rule 183 Book of Constitutions permits a Lodge to delay a resignation by 60 days (previously 21), which will provide time to enact a process and possibly retain the Brother in Masonry. If, however, the resignation later becomes effective, the resignation date remains the date the Lodge secretary first received it, so there is no fear of additional cost to the Lodge.

Lodge secretaries have the responsibility to verbally notify the Lodge of his receipt of a resignation at the next regular meeting and, unless a vote to the contrary takes place, the announcement is an acceptance of that resignation. However, the Lodge may vote that the acceptance is delayed by 60 days. A simple majority of those present and voting by a show of hands is sufficient. The process is identical for a member who announces his resignation in open Lodge.

The ProvGM wants this process to become the standard procedure in every Lodge and requests all Cambridgeshire Lodges make arrangements to bring this about.

In order to facilitate the migration process, Lodge secretaries must notify the Provincial Registrar by email and the Lodge Almoner as soon as a member notifies his resignation. It is important that this notification of resignation takes place as soon as possible because it may be possible to get it withdrawn before the announcement and vote in open Lodge takes place.

The Membership Migration Officer, WBro. Rooke, will then engage with the Provincial Almoner and arrange an exit interview by one of his team (WBros. Mike Fox, Bob Wordsworth and Bharat Khetani) if appropriate. Secretaries will be informed of the outcome.

After the Lodge was closed, 21 of the 25 subscribing Past Masters had a celebratory photograph taken with the new Worshipful Master. Unfortunately, due to health issues the senior Past Master, WBro. Roy Abraham, PJGD, who was WM in 1969, was unable to attend.

Kynaston Lodge continues to maintain a tradition, started shortly after the Consecration meeting of the 26th October 1939, of having a photograph of every Lodge Master. The Lodge currently has three albums of photographs, which have been digitally scanned and made available for all members to view on the Kynaston Lodge website. During the Festive Board a computer displayed a slideshow of all those photographs.

## Kynaston Lodge donates to Prader-Willi care home

From money raised at its Christmas Festival Dinner in December 2019, Kynaston Lodge No. 5810 presented a cheque for £250 to the Corunna Close Residential Care Home in St Neots, which cares for patients suffering Prader-Willi Syndrome.

PWS is a rare genetic disorder that affects both males and females from birth and throughout their lives. It causes low muscle tone with consequent motor developmental delays, a mild to moderate learning difficulty, incomplete sexual development, and emotional and social immaturity, which can lead to challenging behaviour.

During childhood, an overwhelming and insatiable chronic appetite usually develops which, without rigorous food management and exercise regimes, leads to food seeking, stealing and life-threatening obesity. PWS occurs randomly in about 1:22,000 births and it is estimated that there are about 2,000 people living with PWS in the UK.

Claire Creek, wife of Worshipful Master WBro. John Creek, was delighted to receive the support of the Lodge members and partners. Claire, who is the care centre manager, said: "At Corunna my aim is to make every moment count, improve quality of life and set achievable goals, providing a meaningful future".

The four residents require 24/7 supervision with every aspect of daily living. Due to the complexity of the condition it is little understood and as a consequence, the residents can be marginalised in society due to the physically challenging behaviour displayed. PWS affects every moment of every day – constant hunger pains combined with impaired cognitive ability, social awkwardness and a vulnerability that requires one-to-one staffing at all times.

Claire, who has a team of 13 staff, added: *"It's the donations and fundraising which help improve their lives. HFT, a national charity providing services for people with learning disabilities, is always so grateful for everyone's kindness."*

It believes no-one should face a mental health problem alone. It is also committed to tackling stigma and raising awareness of the need for everyone to look after their mental wellbeing.

David Coupland, Immediate Past Master, said: *"Anyone can struggle with their mental health, but we know that farmers are particularly high risk due to the stresses and uncertainty involved with the job. We are therefore delighted to be supporting our local mental health charity and we hope our contribution will help people get the support they need."*

Zoe Doherty, fundraiser for CPSL Mind, added: *"We were so pleased to receive this donation. In 2018/19 we provided more than 21,400 hours of one-to-one support locally, including more than 6,800 hours of talking therapies. Demand for our services remains high and this donation will enable us to help even more people in need of mental health support."*

## Help for children with mental or emotional health problems

Hundreds of children with mental or emotional health issues will receive the therapy they need, thanks to a £15,000 grant from Cambridgeshire Freemasons to the charity, Blue Smile.

The charity works with children between three and 13 who may experience difficulties such as anxiety, self-harm or obsessive-compulsive behaviours. They are given a weekly session with an expert therapist, based on arts and play, providing support for each child for as long as they need it. During term time, Blue Smile helps around 200 children every week.

In Cambridgeshire roughly one in eight children have a diagnosable mental health condition, which equates to each class in a Cambridgeshire school having three affected children. The county has an estimated 13,900 children and young people under the age of 16 with mental health issues, which is the highest in the East of England.

Blue Smile aims to intervene when a child has emerging mental health difficulties, particularly those who have suffered trauma such as abuse, bereavement or domestic violence. Through this, they aim to prevent problems worsening, and protect each child's ability to stay in school and participate fully in school life. Half of all lifetime mental health problems emerge by the age of 14.

The grant from Cambridgeshire Freemasons comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation.

Jess Manley, Charity Director of Blue Smile said: "We're very grateful to Cambridgeshire Freemasons for their generous grant, which will help us to offer support to hundreds of children every week during term time. Often people don't realise the scale of this issue, with, on average, three children in every class being affected by mental health difficulties."

## Companions hear about pioneering research

At the dinner afterwards, the Grand Superintendent presented him with cheques totalling £1,000 to support his work. His work over the last few years has been enhanced by an early grant of £100,000 from the Grand Charity. Prof Coles is also a non-stipendiary priest in the Church of England.

## Safety scheme support at Wisbech
