HONOURS FOR THE PROVINCE

The Province will have a new Deputy Grand Superintendent in the Royal Arch later this year, as well as new Provincial Grand Treasurer and Charity Steward in the Craft. In addition, there are first appointments and promotions in Grand Lodge and Supreme Grand Chapter.

VWBro. Pat Kilby is reappointed Deputy Provincial Grand Master while his new opposite number in the Royal Arch as Deputy Grand Superintendent will be EComp. David Blair, who has been reappointed to Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies in Supreme Grand Chapter.

Our new Provincial Grand Treasurer is WBro. Mark Shields, of St Ovin Lodge, No. 7774, while WBro. David Cameron, of Nourse Lodge No. 8590, takes over as Provincial Grand Charity Steward.

Reappointed as Provincial Senior Grand Warden and Provincial Junior Grand Warden are WBro. Roger Billings, of Etheldreda Lodge No. 2107 and WBro. David Fountain, of Caldwell Lodge No. 3201.

In the Royal Arch, EComp. David Sowman, of St. Andrew Chapter No. 4087, and EComp. Paul Gillingwater, of Caldwell Chapter No. 2727, are reappointed to 2nd and 3rd Provincial Grand Principals respectively.

There is a first appointment to Craft Grand Rank for WBro. Danny Ellis, of St Andrew Lodge No. 4087, who will become a Past Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies. Promoted is WBro. Jonathan Lambert, our Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, who becomes active Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies.

RWBro. Jonathan Spence, of Alma Mater Lodge No. 1492, is re-appointed as Deputy Grand Master, and VWBro. David Staples, of Stone Cross Lodge No. 6704, is re-appointed as Grand Secretary. WBro. Peter Brindle, of Kynaston Lodge No. 5810, is reappointed as Deputy Grand Sword Bearer.

In Supreme Grand Chapter, EComp. Charles Overland, of Etheldreda Chapter No. 809, receives a first appointment as Past Grand Standard Bearer.

Congratulations to WBro. Danny Ellis and EComp. Charles Overland on their thoroughly deserved first appointments to Grand Rank in the Craft and Royal Arch, respectively, as well as WBro. Jonathan Lambert's appointment as an Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies plus two reappointments with WBro. Peter Brindle as Deputy Grand Sword Bearer and, in the Royal Arch, EComp. David Blair as Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies..

We recently announced the Provincial appointments and promotions. Many of the active appointments are the same as in 2020 to give the recipients a chance to enjoy the ranks and serve the Province. There are, however, some changes with EComp. David Blair becoming Deputy Grand Superintendent in September 2021, WBro. Mark Shields replacing him as Provincial Treasurer and WBro. David Cameron being promoted to Provincial Charity Steward in the Craft. WBro Paul Gillingwater will continue as Festival 2023 Chairman.

We also have two new collared offices with WBro. Ian Hardman as Provincial Membership Officer and WBro. Mike Hinton as Provincial Communications Officer. It is good that UGLE has agreed to these new ranks, which also affords the Province the opportunity to recognise two brethren who were carrying out these duties so well over the last year or so. I should also like to thank those standing down; there will be plenty to say about their magnificent service in the coming months.

Whilst we may be over the worst as far as Covid is concerned, I am sure normality will not return as quickly as we would like. To give ourselves the best possible chance of holding full Provincial meetings this year, we have cancelled the meetings on 2nd July and re-arranged Provincial Grand Chapter for Thursday 23rd September and Provincial Grand Lodge for 21st October both at Wisbech St Mary. I am looking forward to both meetings and investing the new Provincial officers whilst also recognising those who were appointed or promoted this year and also in 2020.

I hope we can start to anticipate actual meetings soon, including some emergency meetings over the summer months to catch up on ceremonies and candidates.

Once the future is a little more assured, we shall relaunch Festival 2023 as we look to move closer to our target of £900,000. We have raised over £550,000 and have collected and committed funds of nearly £700,000. We have some way to go to our target, but I know we shall continue to enjoy the challenge and have fun as we embark on the final assault.

I must also congratulate you all on the magnificent response to the Digital Drive initiative to support young people. The results have been beyond my wildest dreams and shows what we can achieve when we work together; over 120 Raspberry Pis and 40 laptops provided to date which is fantastic, thank you so much. It reinforces the sterling achievements of Cambridgeshire freemasons in our local communities during the pandemic. There are more details on page 12.

Membership both in terms of recruitment and retention will be the other key focus as we return. I know our Provincial Membership team is looking forward to engaging with you as we roll out the UGLE pathway initiatives whilst the other UGLE IT initiative, Hermes, will also be introduced this year. You can read more about Hermes on page 13.

The prospect of three new lodges being consecrated in the next year or so is hugely exciting. I can also confirm the postponed Festival of Carols will now be held on 9th December 2022.

Brethren and Companions, we face huge challenges as we resume. We must be patient and considered in what we try to do but I know that collectively the Province will again demonstrate its quality, depth and resilience.

Volunteers support vaccination drive

With the United Grand Lodge of England encouraging its 200,000 members to roll up their sleeves and volunteer to help vaccinate the population, Cambridgeshire brethren are playing their part.



WBro. David Robertson, of Gild of St Mary Lodge No. 7288 in Cambridge, is volunteering at the large scale hub at the city's Grafton Centre. Speaking about his first shift, he said:

"It was the busiest day since opening the previous Thursday and we completed an amazing 350-plus vaccinations in the first session. Although very exhausting, it was absolutely brilliant to be involved and helping so many people at once to get protected. My role was to direct and control the public after they had been assessed for having the vaccination by a trained medical professional. This took about 10-15 minutes. Every chair and even the notices put on them then had to be fully sanitised after each use."

The Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, WBro. Jonathan Lambert, of Etheldreda Lodge No. 2107 in Newmarket, has been volunteering as a steward at the Lavenham vaccine centre in Suffolk. He said:

"Lavenham is primarily a drive-in centre so people arriving for their vaccines are registered in their cars and wait there until they are called in. This is managed by the stewards and so far the centre has been vaccinating 450-500 people per day. The overwhelmingly gratitude of the people receiving their vaccines has been the greatest reward for volunteering. To be part of that process has been fantastic and very worthwhile."



Bro. Steve Morgan, of Gild of St Mary Lodge No. 7288 in Cambridge, is volunteering at Cley Farm vaccine centre in Trumpington. He said "I have fulfilled the position of car park marshal. Standing in the cold for hours on end waving your arms about is not the most glamorous of jobs, but knowing that I am helping, albeit in a small way, to support the NHS beat this virus is fulfilling and it is better than doing nothing."

Bro. Lee Mitchell, of Caldwell Lodge No. 3201 in March, is helping out at the vaccination centre in Huntingdon. "I feel so privileged to work alongside other volunteers and health care professionals to deliver the vaccine."



WBro. Tim Cox, of Fenland Farmers Lodge No. 9933 in Whittlesey, is volunteering at the Springfields centre, in Spalding, Lincolnshire. He said:

"I'm very pleased to have had the opportunity to support the delivery of Covid vaccinations at Springfields centre. We have a great band of helpers and it is a joy to see the happy faces of those arriving to get their vaccinations, particularly the ones who have not been out of their homes since March 2020. It is heartening to see the daily vaccination totals rising steadily and before long we will be welcoming back those who are due their second jab. It really does feel like light at the end of a very long tunnel."

Top cricketer 'visits' Alma Mater meeting

A video Q&A session with top cricketer Sir Alastair Cook was the highlight of the Alma Mater Lodge No. 1492 virtual meeting on 27th February.

The session given by former England captain Sir Alastair was in connection with his autobiography, written in conjunction with Michael Calvin. Sir Alastair is the English batsman who has scored the most runs for his country in test matches, namely 12,472 at an average of 45.35, with 33 centuries.



Alastair answered a wide range of questions from members - here are some of his responses:

- What are your views on the psychology of dealing with stress? Mental toughness is essential in opening batsmen.
- Favourite cricketing venue? Lord's.
- Greatest personal achievement? Away victory in India in 2012/13 after 27 years (won 2-1) and away victory in Australia in 2010/11 after 23 years (won 3-1).
- Can current test team achieve number 1 status? Yes within two years.
- Advice to an England captain? Be yourself, trust yourself and listen to other people.
- How much longer will you play? Not known, but will play for Essex for at least one more year.
- Favourite batting partner? Graham Gooch.
- How do you switch off - Working on the family farm.
- What advice would you give to a young cricketer? You have to enjoy what you are doing. There will more times you fail than succeed.

At the conclusion of the video the Worshipful Master (pictured left, holding a copy of Alistair's biography) joined the meeting and thanked everyone for their contribution to a successful evening.

Grant provides therapy kits

A local charity using arts-based therapies to support the wellbeing of children has received a £250 grant from the Masonic Charitable Foundation's Covid fund.

Blue Smile uses its therapies to unlock children's potential to learn and be happy. It supports children from aged three to 13 years, all with mental health issues, with arts and play based therapies.

Zoe Bunter, of Blue Smile, said: "We are very grateful for the support of Cambridgeshire Freemasons who have funded six Individual therapy kits for our children's 1:1 therapy, through the Masonic Charitable Foundation. This will ensure that Cambridgeshire children with mental health problems, who have also been affected by the pandemic, lockdown and school closures, can receive the expert support they need.

"To ensure that risk of transmission of coronavirus is minimised, each child that Blue Smile helps now needs their own therapy kit for use in school. These kits, containing art materials and toys, help children express and understand their feelings during their therapy sessions."

Through its partnership with schools, Blue Smile helps about 200 children, aged three to 13, each week with one-to-one therapy, but it didn't need that number of therapy kits, which each cost around £40. The kits contain items such as Play-dough, games, paints and brushes, coloured card, craft items, toy cars and puppets.

Wisbech brother's double celebration

A stalwart of Wisbech freemasonry, who celebrated his 90th birthday in February, has achieved the landmark of 65 years in the Craft.

WBro. Bernard Lyons was born on 4th February 1931 in Aldershot and moved to Wisbech in 1933. He attended Wisbech Grammar School and started his career with G.A. Wheeler & Co in 1948 as an articled clerk. After serving as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Army Pay Corps in Edinburgh, he returned to accountancy and in 1970 was a senior partner in Wheeler & Co until his retirement. He enjoyed all sport, particularly boxing with over 100 bouts and only eight defeats. Bernard married Elizabeth in 1953 and they have two children - Ann and Margaret - and six grandchildren.



Bernard's Masonic career began on 5th December 1956 when he was initiated into The Gild of Holy Trinity Lodge No. 6125. He became its Worshipful Master in 1967 and was appointed a Trustee of the Wisbech Masonic Benevolent Fund, staying for some 37 years during which time he was chairman for 10 years. He became Secretary of the Lodge between from 1971 to 1989 and then Charity Steward until 1995. He has been Mentor of Gild of Holy Trinity for a number of years. He joined Cambridgeshire Installed Masters Lodge No. 7427 in 1968 and served as Worshipful Master in 1989.

Appointed Provincial Grand Standard Bearer in 1974, he was promoted to Past Provincial Senior Grand Deacon in 1979, Past Provincial Grand Treasurer in 1982, Provincial Junior Grand Warden in 1985 and Provincial Senior Grand Warden in 2020. He received the Provincial Grand Master's Certificate of Service to Masonry in 2011.

In the Royal Arch, he was exalted into Etheldreda Chapter No. 809 at Wisbech, served as First Principal in 1983 and Director of Ceremonies from 1993 to 2004. He was appointed to the rank of Past Provincial Grand Treasurer in 1986 and to Provincial Grand Scribe Nehemiah and Grand Treasurer in April 1987.

Friends need support from Lodges

Covid restrictions have meant many charities have struggled to maintain their income, including the Friends of Cornwallis Court, the RMBI home in Bury St Edmunds, where the monthly coffee mornings have been suspended leading to a shortfall of about £200 a month.

The Friends of Cornwallis Court raise funds and administer help and comfort to the men and women residents at the home. The help ranges from paying for hairdressing to entertainment or supplying volunteer drivers and purchasing equipment such as wheelchairs and beds.

Some volunteers ensure the male residents regularly have masonic-orientated discussions, which, just before lockdown, even included an LOI session at Ashlar House when the response from senior masons was quite emotional.

Like all registered charities, the Friends are struggling to maintain income while continuing to have regular outgoings that are being financed from resources. Many lodges in the provinces of Cambridgeshire, Norfolk and Suffolk send a regular annual subscription. Those Lodges not supplying support are urged to send some small form of help.



There is no minimum or maximum figure, but if every lodge pledged £100 a year it would be well received and faithfully applied. Lodges may wish to try other forms of fundraising too. Individual masons can set up regular small donations.

WBro David Leon Bays

Having celebrated 50 years in Freemasonry in April 2020, WBro. David Bays, a stalwart of Freemasonry in the Province of Cambridgeshire and particularly in Wisbech, passed to the Grand Lodge above on 9th January.

Born in 1933 in Wisbech, where he spent his childhood and early teenage life, David had three older siblings - Don, John (who also became a Mason) and Barbara. On leaving school he was called up for National Service, which he spent in Germany. After National Service he worked for the Wisbech printers, Balding and Mansell, before becoming a printing consultant until his retirement.

David and his wife Jan, who were married for 62 years, had two children, Rachel and Adam. For much of their married life, the couple lived at Tydd St Mary, where David was involved in many aspects of village life, particularly the church and village hall. Indeed, David was still cutting the grass in the churchyard until a few months before his death.

His Masonic career began in 1970 when he was initiated into the Gild of Holy Trinity Lodge No. 6125 at Wisbech. He was installed as Worshipful Master in 1985, eventually being appointed Past Provincial Grand Junior Warden in 2008 and Past Provincial Grand Senior Warden in 2016. He was also a member of Cambridgeshire Installed Master's Lodge No.7421. He was exalted into Etheldreda Royal Arch Chapter No.809 and became its First Principal in 1992 and attained the rank of Past Provincial Grand Scribe Nehemiah.

David joined the Gild of Good Fellowship Lodge of Mark Master Masons No. 141, becoming its Master in 1995 and attained the rank of Past Provincial Grand Senior Warden, and Wysbech Trinity Chapter Rose Croix No.822 where he was Most Wise Sovereign in 1993 and in 2006 was promoted to the 31st Degree. In 2007 he served as MWS of the Cambs and Isle of Ely Chapter Rose Croix No.1157.

From 2004, he was a member of the Trustees of the Wisbech Masonic Benevolent Fund and its chairman for the past 10 years.

Many will remember his cheeky smile, the wink of encouragement, his adherence to the signs of 6125, an ability to take on any position or recite ritual at short notice, his willingness to help others, along with his compassion, generosity, dedication as Almoner, knowledge, support and encouragement, and, of course, his friendship. His funeral was held in February at King's Lynn.

The role of the Provincial Treasurer, WBro. David Blair

Since being appointed to the office it has become clear to me that the Provincial Treasurer is viewed as a cross between the Sheriff of Nottingham and Scrooge McDuck. After years of entering a room to a range of shouted epithets - some more complimentary than others - I thought the time was right to set the record straight and explain exactly what the job involves.

Of course at the heart of the role is managing the Provincial accounts. However, there are two other elements that I consider of particular importance.

The first of these is a plan to ensure that brethren within Cambridgeshire continue to enjoy outstanding value for money from their membership. This involves working with all the Provincial team to control costs while maintaining the quality of our events, publications and other activities. I regularly speak with the treasurers of neighbouring Provinces to compare experiences and to share best practice.

The second element is to safeguard the financial health of the Province so that resources are in place not only to meet our immediate needs but also to fund strategic projects which will support our future development.

As Treasurer, I am an ex-officio trustee of this Provincial Charity for Care and Relief, which supports Masonic and non-Masonic causes throughout Cambridgeshire. As a registered charity this part of the job is technically more complex than the Provincial Grand Lodge accounts and my role includes governance as well as financial management.

A more rewarding aspect is the consideration of grant applications with the other trustees and seeing at first hand the impact that our work as Freemasons has on the community. I also work with the investment team to manage our portfolio to ensure that the charity can continue to do its important work in the long term.



Although less prominent during the current Festival, the Provincial Building Fund is an important initiative that continues to receive regular income. We have a strong framework in place for the effective deployment of funds when circumstances dictate.

The last year has seen a lot of time spent with the executive, the Cambridgeshire Masonic Benevolent Association managers and the communications team to coordinate the various initiatives that the Province has supported in response to the Covid pandemic. My appointment as an ex-officio trustee of CMBA allows me to stay abreast of that charity's work and help ensure that our activities are coordinated for maximum effectiveness.

There are several other elements of my role which extend beyond a purely financial remit. I occasionally have the pleasure of representing the Provincial Grand Master at various events and so have the opportunity to meet individual members throughout the Province. That is truly the most enjoyable aspect of the job and I look forward to the resumption of our meetings as soon as is safe to do so.

Century for chapter stalwart

In January Kynaston Chapter No. 5810 marked the 100th birthday of its senior Past First Principal, EComp. Doug Forsdyke with the presentation of a commemorative glass bowl.

The inscription read: Presented to EComp. Douglas Eric Forsdyke Past 3rd Provincial Grand Principal, founder member and first IPZ of Kynaston Chapter No. 5810, holder of the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent's Certificate of Service to Royal Arch Masonry on the occasion of his 100th birthday, 10th January 2021.

Born in 1921, he became a pupil at the Cambridge and County High School for Boys, where he played cricket and rugby. Afterwards he played for Shelford Rugby Club's First XV and eventually became a referee. During World War Two, he served in the RAF. His working career was in accountancy.

Douglas was initiated into Thirkill Lodge No. 7333 on 22nd April 1968 and became its Master in 1977. He joined Virtute et Fide Lodge No. 7959 in 1972 and was installed as its Master in 1985. In 1978 he became a joining member of the Cambridgeshire Installed Masters Lodge No. 7429 and was not only a founder member of Cambridgeshire Meridian Lodge No. 9687 but was its first Senior Warden, becoming Master in 1999.

In 1984 Douglas was appointed Provincial Grand Registrar, being promoted in 1988 to Provincial Senior Grand Warden. In 1997 he received the Provincial Grand Master's Certificate of Service to Masonry.

In the Royal Arch, he was exalted into Chapter of Fidelity No. 441 in 1973 and installed as MEZ in 1983. He was a founder of Kynaston Chapter No. 5810 in 1988 and in March 1990 became its MEZ. In 1993 he was a founder of the Cambridgeshire First Principals Chapter No. 7429 and took the office of MEZ in 2002. He was appointed Third Provincial Grand Principal in 1995.

The Library and Museum Committee at Freemasons' Hall, at Cambridge, has been re-energised and, after a fairly long hiatus, has had appointed a new chairman, secretary and new interested members to help bring the library and museum to more members of the Province and to hopefully a wider audience.

WBro. Brian Elliott has been appointed Chairman of the committee and is well known to everyone in the Province, particularly as a former Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies. He has a real interest in history and particularly that of the Province and has the energy to push the committee forward.

The new Secretary is WBro. Simon Cooper, of Isaac Newton University Lodge No. 859. It will greatly benefit the committee to have an INUL member on the committee because the lodge is, after all, fifty per cent owners of the Cambridge Masonic Hall and the lodge has a long and fascinating history.

The rest of the committee is WBro. Jon West (Treasurer); WBro. Justin Curtis (Curator); Bro. Jen Barback (Lady Freemason, SW in Granta Ladies and a museum specialist); WBro. Paul Ashby (displays specialist); WBro. Kevin Mader (Provincial Grand Secretary and keen historical researcher); WBro. Mike Hinton (publicity/promotions); WBro. Graham Jackson (historical interest and project planning); WBro. Jon Creek (amateur bookbinder and bibliophile); and Bro. Will Wilson (who works for the Fitzwilliam Museum).

The museum has relocated from the Grand Officers' room to the second lodge room which remains a working facility. The purpose of moving the museum was to make it more easily accessible to the brethren which it was felt was not achievable in the Grand Officers' room.

The committee will be changing the displays regularly while ensuring that the displays remain focussed on Cambridgeshire, the members of the Province and the seven Provincial centres.

The committee plans to develop a page to be added to the Provincial website to assist with promotion and will use social media and the Cambridgeshire Freemason publication to assist with promotion. It has also taken charge of the archiving of Masonic records and is in discussions with Cambridge Masonic Hall about allowing lodges to store crucial records at Bateman Street.

The museum will be accessible to all brethren when the Hall is open for Masonic business, and by special appointment, and will also be open to the public by appointment.

Keep your eye on social media to find out what will be on display in the coming period once we are out of the current COVID restrictions.

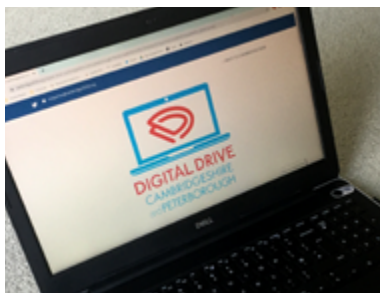

Speedy response to computer campaign

Lodges, Chapters and individual brethren in the Province are supporting a local campaign to provide children with computers to enable them to access lessons and online resources. The original request came from Provincial Grand Master, RWBro. William Dastur on 15th February and, within a month more than 40 laptops and the funds for over 100 Raspberry Pi computers have already been donated.



The ProvGM/GSupt asked brethren to support the Digital Drive Cambridgeshire and Peterborough initiative to help the 8,000 young people who do not have laptops or PCs.

"The situation is unacceptable, and I believe we as Freemasons can make a difference and support these children and young people," he said. The original request was for every Lodge and Chapter to make a single donation of £88 to cover the purchase of a Raspberry Pi 400 with a webcam. RWBro. Dastur also urged brethren to donate old or unused laptops.

Digital Drive is working in partnership with Cambridgeshire County Council, Peterborough City Council, the Cambs Youth Panel, Cambridge Digital Partnership, and Cambridge 2030 to make sure that every child across our county can access their schoolwork at home.

Phil Priestly, of the Cambs Youth Panel, said: "The Digital Drive is an essential part of eliminating the problem of digital inequality that we have in our region. The contribution of Cambridgeshire Freemasons is an incredible support towards what we are doing – both in terms of recycling previously owned equipment and in purchasing brand new computers for children and young people. The COVID-19 pandemic has really highlighted the depth of digital inequality in our region. The good will and the community spirit that has been displayed in this response is remarkable and uplifting for everyone involved."

UGLE Project Hermes roll out

Hermes is a new UGLE management application whereby every Lodge and Chapter will be required to update and upload their own data online. This will automatically link into UGLE's central database 'Adelphi'. Ultimately, all current paper forms will be eliminated.

It will represent a huge change to the administration of Lodges and Chapters, but will be a compulsory requirement of UGLE. The launch date is currently planned for later in 2021 and in preparation a Provincial Hermes Strategy Group, in line with UGLE requirements, has been formed and are already meeting.

The Strategy Group consists of DepProvGM VWBro Patrick Kilby, WBro. Kevin Mader, WBro. John Jones, EComp. Edmund Brookes ProvScribeE and WBro. Andrew Badcock.

Secretaries and ScribeE's will be granted access to Hermes via individual passwords to enable them to update their Lodge and Chapter data, and to generate their own reports. Every Lodge and Chapter will have an individual set of credentials.

We are very fortunate that the Province of Cambridgeshire is one of very few Provinces to have its own online system, Cambsec. Therefore, most Secretaries and ScribeE's should be fairly conversant with what will be required.



Although Cambsec has developed into something much more than just an administration tool for Secretaries and ScribeE's, it will certainly make Hermes far easier to understand and will be run in conjunction with Hermes.

From a login screen, Secretaries and ScribeE's will be guided through all the normal administration of their Lodge or Chapter through a series of menu-driven screens; from the introduction of Candidates to applying for Grand Lodge Certificates.

The Province will manage user access to Hermes for all Lodges and Chapters in Cambridgeshire. Full training and support will be provided to all Secretaries and ScribeE's.

Ely lodge reclaims important jewel

Occasionally, when comfortably at home something comes along which shatters the prevailing atmosphere of smug contentment. While it might not get oceans of adrenalin pumping, it does generate a deal of excitement.

So it was last August when WBro. Bill Harrison, secretary of St Audrey Lodge No. 2727, received several emails from brethren of other Lodges informing him that the St Audrey Lodge's Consecrating Master's Jewel had appeared in an auction schedule for Lockdale's in Ipswich. The auction was due to be held in September.

Lodge brethren were contacted to inform them of the good news and to entreat them to leave Bill to co-ordinate bids. WBro. Paul Gillingwater, who has bid for Founder's Jewels in the past, and WBro. Nigel Davies, who has an account at Lockdale's, were contacted and agreed to take over the acquisition of this most important artefact. On the day of the auction, Paul was able to secure the jewel for the Lodge for a manageable sum.

In 1898 the brethren of Scientific Lodge No. 88 petitioned for a new lodge at Ely. The Provincial Grand Master, RWBro. Colonel Robert Townley Caldwell, consecrated the Lodge on 22nd November 1898 in the Old Dispensary in St. Mary's Street, after which WBro. J. M. Harvey was installed as the first Master.



Sadly, the Lodge knows little of the history of the Consecrating Master's jewel between then and now. WBro Davies attempted to contact the vendor through Lockdale's, but, after several weeks awaiting a response, nothing was forthcoming, so the trail has gone cold. That is, however, not the end of the story. The Centenary Year Lodge Rulers, namely the Worshipful Master WBro. Paul Gillingwater, along with Senior Warden WBro. Richard Hough and Junior Warden WBro. Bob Smith, agreed to pay for the Jewel and donate it, and the two Founders Jewels owned by Paul, to the Lodge.

These will be exhibited at Ely Masonic Hall in a display cabinet provided by WBro. Roy Peacock PPJGW, CSM. Subsequently, on checking in the Hall, an additional two Founders jewels were discovered on display, one in the robing room and one in the bar. It seems

that now, in addition to the Consecrating Master's Jewel, the Lodge has those of a Steward, the Director of Ceremonies, the Tyler and one that, a great deal of research would suggest, was probably awarded to WBro. J. Read who was to take the position of Immediate Past Master.

Gold medal and MBE for Nourse brother

A member of Nourse Lodge No. 8590 in Cambridge has been appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire in the Queen's Birthday Honours list.

Brother Haydn Jakes, 24, a former Marshall Aerospace and Defence Group apprentice, was nominated for his achievements as an aircraft engineering apprentice and for winning gold in the 'Skills Olympics' in Russia last year.

He was an airframe and propulsion apprentice at Marshall ADG from 2013 to 2017 and last August beat 16 hopefuls from around the world to win a coveted gold medal for Great Britain in the WorldSkills International Competition in the Aircraft Maintenance category.

"I started my apprenticeship at Marshall ADG in 2013 and was entered into the WorldSkills competitions in 2017 which was my last year as an apprentice," said Haydn, who was a joining member of Nourse Lodge in February 2020. Haydn was selected for additional training and competitive selection for a place on TeamUK as the UK representative for the aircraft maintenance skill.

In 2019 he was chosen for TeamUK and won the gold medal in aircraft maintenance at the WorldSkills Kazan International Finals 2019. Haydn won by one per cent, with 78% compared to the Russian and Chinese competitors who secured joint silver at 77%.

"I could not have made this amazing achievement had it not been for the generosity of the Brethren from the Association of Medical, University and Legal Lodges and the University of London Lodge, who awarded me a grant of £1,500

The grant, which came shortly before departing to compete in the International Finals, meant I could dedicate more time to training for the competition which ultimately made the difference," he said.

Ely Community Christmas Meal Appeal gets £2,587

Following a successful online quiz, Descensus Aquarum Lodge No. 8655 in Ely presented a cheque for £2,587 to the Ely Community Christmas Meal Appeal. They used a list of those who normally benefit from the Christmas dinner, often the elderly, vulnerable and lonely, but also struggling families, and made visits to them in the run up to Christmas to keep in touch, lift their spirits and identify any needs or assistance that they might require.

On Christmas Day they delivered a hot cooked meal or microwaveable meal, together with a cracker and table decoration. Where possible, they organised a virtual Christmas in the afternoon, on Zoom, with the Queen's speech, recordings of some carols from the cathedral.

The funds raised will help provide safe living conditions, healthcare, meals, and employment opportunities for the homeless; as well as helping protect them from the winter weather, which kills hundreds of homeless people every year.

It came at a time when Freemasons across the country were volunteering their time at 26 homeless support organisations.



Giles Cornell, Pastor of the Ely Lighthouse Centre and principal organiser of the Ely Community Christmas Meal Appeal said: "The Appeal is blown away by the generosity of the local community in general, and that this donation from Descensus Aquarum and the Cambridgeshire Freemasons will make a big difference, guaranteeing that they can distribute the Christmas meals without any charge.

"Thanks to your kindness we were able to deliver meals to 90 families and individuals, many of whom could not afford a lavish 3 course meal, along with a large hamper of Christmas goodies."
