#### Our Provincial Grand Master's address to the Brethren..

The seven-year strategy espoused by the Pro Grand Master seeks to build an integrated organisation fit for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and, more importantly, one fit to develop and grow, not just survive. In articulating "one organisation and one journey" it is crystal clear that the Craft and the Royal Arch are inextricably linked and must forge the future together benefitting from their respective strengths.

His strategy has three key areas of emphasis:-Membership, Governance and Charity/ Community and I should like to address each of these briefly.



I am thrilled that in 2022 we saw a growth in discrete members of 3.4% an increase of 45 to 1357 whilst in total memberships we increased by 4.6% to 1782. So far in 2023 we have continued this growth with 46 initiates and a 1.8% increase to 1382 and 1816 memberships - very much a return to pre pandemic levels.

Well done brethren but more particularly to WBro. Ed Williams, our Membership Officer, and the Pathway team so ably led by my Deputy, VWBro. Pat Kilby, ensuring Cambridgeshire continues to be at the forefront, more than meeting the Pro's challenge of 1% growth by year three.

The Membership officer role, whilst relatively new, is a hugely important one. WBro. Williams has assumed this vital office and ensured in his first year we have made great progress as the figures for 2022 and 2023 illustrate. In ensuring that the Membership Pathway essentials have been fully rolled out to all our lodges with simple Lodge Plans and officer succession planning encouraged, I do believe the Province and its lodges are making good headway in fulfilling the growth and governance aspirations espoused in the strategy.

But this is just one element with retention an equally important factor. It remains vital that we start to encourage back those brethren who have stayed away and are out of the habit of attending.

To me, their return is our greatest challenge and yet the easiest way of avoiding membership decline. This is something for us all to do in each lodge. We can't just leave it to Almoners, Mentors and Membership Officers - although they have a key role to play too.

Brethren, in some ways we are all membership officers and what is more we should relish this role of growing the Order – encouraging friends, making introductions, supporting the exhibition trailer at local events, Masonic centre open days and White Table evenings to introduce freemasonry at convivial dinners are all there as suitable enablers.

Areally successful Open Day at Ely, so ably organised by WBro. Ian Hardman, brought in over ten positive enquiries. It worked so well with all the Ely lodges supporting this whilst involving local charities and lady freemasons on the day. I have no doubt this will prove a good template for others.

Moving on to governance, engagement and indeed succession. With summary lodge plans in place, I would urge all lodges to start to address succession planning and how we maintain interest and an undoubted talent pipeline.

We should encourage newer members and aspiring brethren to want to be involved and have a strong reason to continue to belong. We have to be much less critical and demanding of those who, perhaps we perceive, don't appreciate or can't satisfy the standards and commitments expected 40 and 50 years ago.

Open criticism in lodge is unacceptable and in the 21st century we should aim to embrace the best of 21st century attitudes and behaviours - especially inclusiveness and tolerance. We are building a living organisation to thrive another 300 years or more ....not a museum.



#### ...at the annual meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge

Engagement is so important and I have been particularly pleased to see, and also support first hand, the new buddy initiative from the Light Blues as they invite and support newly initiated brethren to see an Initiation shortly after their own. This has been hugely appreciated, really successful and both Pat and I have enjoyed the opportunities to join them at meetings. The Light Blues continue to grow and support the lodges in the Province. They deserve our respect, support, encouragement and gratitude.



In just over 15 months, we have consecrated three new lodges, all with a different raison d'etre. We were able to consecrate Hutchinson Masters, a daylight lodge for Installed Masters in March 2023 and I believe there are opportunities for more – particularly special interest lodges. Some embryo ideas are currently being considered but what about following the lead of other Provinces who have recently introduced specialist new lodges for sportsmen, anglers, shooting, motorcycle and automotive enthusiasts, or perhaps fine dining! We can seize on them as examples of platforms as to how to grow and engender or revive interest.

Old Leysian Lodge has its Centenary celebrations planned for November - whilst Kynaston has a banner re-dedication in December, both examples of our endurance and relevance.

W/Bro Mike Hinton, who is our Provincial Communications Officer, has ensured that we continue to get the best out of the media opportunities available and I should like to thank him and his talented team. Our ability to embrace all media formats is critical for the future of Freemasonry and particularly this Province. We must promote Freemasonry through local publicity, open days, community engagement and through our strongest asset - our commitment to charity. So, it was pleasing to organise another successful Festival of Carols in December last year raising £30,000 for the Ely Cathedral and Maggies both local community assets who do so much to support the people of Cambridgeshire.

In terms of charity and community, our two charities lead the way for us with the CMBA collecting for the Festival whilst Care & Relief has a formidable endowment of nearly £600,000.

With recurring annual income and distributions of around £20,000 per annum we can and do make a great difference locally whilst still having the firepower for large one-off donations. Before Christmas, utilising the MCF and our own matched funding we were able to distribute, an additional £20,000 supporting, foodbanks, the homeless and Christmas Meals - that is freemasonry in the community.

We have already heard that the Festival appeal supporting the MCF, your charity, is likely to reach seven figures and I am grateful for your support and enthusiasm. With effectively just under six weeks to go, now is the time to make those final commitments to send in the funds from your lodge events.

You may wish to plan, or even invest in your wife's or partner's wardrobe for Thursday 21st September when the final total will be announced at Queens' College with the Deputy Grand Master present. You have been amazing, smashing the target despite having lost over 15 months to Covid.

I must thank WBro. Paul Gillingwater, our Festival Chairman, and our Provincial Charity Steward, WBro. David Cameron, and his Cambridgeshire Masonic Benevolent Association executive team, who have been relentless in their enthusiasm and inventive plans notably selling anything that can be made in light blue, and I believe they have a final surprise in store for you!

It was a huge delight to see David receive his Grand Rank in April as well as WBro. Bharat Khetani, the present High Sheriff, with his appointment as Past Junior Grand Deacon whilst WBro. Edmund Brookes was promoted to Active Deputy Grand Sword Bearer.





#### Our Grand Superintendent's address to the Companions...

We are entering an exciting new era with a new Pro First Grand Principal and a strategy developed in conjunction with the Craft that sees One Organisation and One Journey for candidates for Freemasonry. The implicit message being - we are working together with a common purpose - must excite every companion in this room today. I know a number of us are anxious to find out more about the Archway project but we must be patient and curb our enthusiasm a little longer.

Our Deputy Grand Superintendent. EComp. David Blair, is on the working party so we do have the opportunity to be in the forefront of this new initiative as it rolls out, probably later this year or early 2024. Having said that, it does not prevent us from doing a lot of the pre-work and developing our plans and strategy to increase membership as well as improve the engagement and enjoyment of all companions, particularly those who are relatively new to Chapter.

With the burgeoning Clarets - a first, I think in the Royal Arch - professing Companionship, Compassion and Comprehension - what THREE better words to sum up Freemasonry and particularly the Royal Arch?



I am delighted with the announcement of the Clarets - an excellent adjunct to the Light Blues in the Craft. This initiative from the Deputy Grand Superintendent and Provincial Scribe Ezra with its own distinctive tie clip is another way in which we can engage positively with newer exaltees.

We are now back to previous levels of attendance in a number of Chapters with visitors swelling our meetings – a very welcome sign. There are still those who remain reticent about returning and we must as a priority rekindle their interest and entice them back so that they can once again enjoy the Royal Arch, ceremonies and festive boards.

Whilst we experienced a small reduction in numbers last year - our first full year back - 2023 has started well with 22 exaltations already and, together with joiners, means we have an overall increase of 22 in 2023 already more than offsetting our net loss of 11 last year. Well done Deputy Grand Superintendent!

Our membership ratio is still around 44% of the Craft numbers and over 50% if one asks how many Cambridgeshire Craft Freemasons are members of the Royal Arch!

The Exaltation ceremony is the culmination of our initial journey into Freemasonry so we should be encouraging or attracting recent Master Masons and finding ways to accommodate their Exaltations, if necessary, with multiple candidates or additional meetings. Please don't disappoint or lose the opportunity to grow this lovely order.

Once we have achieved this, I am happy for the other Orders also to recruit – a thriving, growing membership benefits us all. The Royal Arch is such a special order and we must concentrate on keeping our meetings, start times, ceremonies and festive boards relevant and attractive to all, especially the needs of the newer and younger Mason.

Sharing the work, involving newer members but, above all, producing something memorable and fulfilling for the new exaltee is essential. If he remembers it as very special and different, then he is undoubtedly our best ambassador for attracting others to join.



### ...at the annual meeting of Provincial Grand Chapter

Remember that long meetings can turn candidates off just when we want to excite them. It is not necessary, or even desirable, to deliver all the lectures on one evening especially after an Exaltation. They can be useful material for meetings where there is no candidate.

The Royal Arch lectures can lend themselves to being delivered catechistically and this also ensures wider participation whilst also perhaps accommodating those who wish to move up the ladder through early involvement.

We know that not all of us find ritual easy, especially learning extensive tracts. Taking office and then participating in the ceremonies should be enjoyable and something one wants to do. I firmly believe that no-one should be precluded from taking office because they can't remember a full ceremony but, equally and importantly, reaching the chairs should not be seen as a right... and, therefore, aspiring Companions must put in the effort to earn such recognition.

We must also ensure that the standard of our ritual is constantly improved and never demeaned through shoddy, ill-prepared delivery, particularly reading it. A little planning can usually find a Companion who would jump at the opportunity to deliver a piece.

Whilst I am opposed to the Exaltation ceremony being read, I do appreciate last-minute dropouts do happen, especially with busy younger members. Substitutes do need to lock themselves away for 10-15 minutes to ensure that they understand what is to be read and deliver it with the right emphasis. You never see theatre stand-ins not having prepared and you certainly wouldn't want to attend if they hadn't.

I congratulate all those who have received a first appointment or promotion today, on what I hope has been a special day for you and I hope it will encourage you to work harder for this lovely order and your chapters. To the Provincial Officers retiring today, I thank you for your tremendous support during your time in office and I welcome the new team. I hope you will enjoy your time in your respective roles.

EComp. David Sowman is stepping down today as Provincial Second Grand Principal. He has served the Province well in both this role and previously as Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies. We shall all miss his enthusiasm and attention to detail. David, thank you for all you have done for the Royal Arch so far, representing the Province at Chapters and other Provincial Meetings. In his place we have an old friend and experienced hand EComp. Edmund Brookes, who only stood down last year as Provincial Grand Scribe Ezraone just can't keep him away - but I know he will add a lot to the team and is eagerly anticipating joining you in your ceremonies.

It was so pleasing to see EComp. Mike Hinton receive Grand Rank recognition in April – he has done so much in his first year as Provincial Third Grand Principal not to mention his huge Communications successes both here and in the Craft.

Now today doesn't just happen. EComp. Jon West is in his first year as Provincial Grand Scribe Ezra - and I think he has done a great job in masterminding the administration for this meeting. EComp. Mark Upex has taken up the reigns of Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies this year. A big thank to both of you and your teams - and especially for trying to control the uncontrollable - the Grand Superintendent!

#### Certificate for Service to Masonry - WBro. Bill Finney

In making the award to WBro. Bill Finney, the Provincial Grand Master said: "This certificate certificate is awarded rarely and then only to Brethren who have given distinguished service to the Province, their lodge or Freemasonry generally. In my time there have been just three. Therefore, in considering suitable and deserving candidates it has to be for service which has been special, consistent or different.

"WBro. Bill Finney was initiated in 1991 and we were born in the same year - so you see Brethren, cream really does rise to the top!



"WBro. Finney has been Worshipful Master of his Mother Lodge three times and also the Master of Cambridgeshire Meridian Lodge. He has been a Companion of the Royal Arch since 1999, having been exalted into Fidelity Chapter No. 441.

"At Province level he became active Provincial Grand Standard Bearer in 2008, was promoted in 2013 and since 2019 has held the rank of Past Provincial Grand Superintendent of Works.

"He is always willing to help out in his lodge and is currently Senior Deacon <u>and</u> Almoner. Throughout his career he has held many other offices, always willing to step in and hold the fort temporarily or for the year. This has resulted in him going on to the Master's chair as vacancies have occurred.

"Although WBro. Finney has officially been in the chair four times, he is a bit of a 'squatter' in his Mother Lodge – since he always seems to be performing ceremonies, often at the last minute, whenever I have turned up, and - if not in the chair - then reprising other important pieces of ritual. Despite occasional medical difficulties he is a very willing and supportive member of his lodges and the Province and rarely misses a meeting.

"A good family man who introduced his son into Freemasonry, WBro. Finney is devoted to his wife and currently a key carer so I am very pleased that he has been able to join us today."

#### Cambridge Lodges unite to support links

Representatives of several Cambridge college lodges, along with the Oxford & Cambridge University Lodge, Isaac Newton University Lodge and the Order of Women Freemasons' Granta Lodge met at Bateman Street, Cambridge, in March, to discuss improving ties between University and College lodges.



Other topics included ways to support Cambridge students interested in Freemasonry, helping the OWF in establishing a women's lodge for students at Cambridge and the idea of establishing a Cambridge University society dedicated to Freemasonry.

The discussions followed a successful Freshers' fair in October, where representatives from both Grand Lodges, co-ordinated by WBro. Omaid Hiwaizi (O&C University Lodge) took time to provide information and answer questions from new students. Nearly 40 students signed up for more information, including 14 for the OWF. Many of those that had expressed an interest subsequently attended a social organised later that week in Cambridge, being a walk out to Grantchester with several INUL brethren followed by a pub lunch.



WBro. Richard Field (Caius Lodge) observed "from our perspective, this was an excellent initiative, not something we've done before but it was great to 'get Freemasonry out there' and we got so much genuine interest and engagement it was fantastic to see".

WBro. Simon Cooper, of INUL, added: "We really wanted to maintain that engagement and give people the opportunity to meet and to find out more from other students, or recent graduates, that were in the lodge. In fact, several of those that attended the social, expressed an interest in joining and have been among the most recent candidates for INUL."



By establishing closer ties with the other college lodges and the Province of Cambridgeshire, brethren will be able to easily find a masonic home in Cambridge, or London upon graduation, in line with the aims of the Universities Scheme. To this end members of the group – Wbros. Omaid Hiwaizi (O&C University Lodge), Simon Cooper (INUL), Peter Featherman (Lodge of Trinity) and Bro. Karen Ottewell (Granta) – met at Bateman street, with UGLE members, and afterwards attended an INUL meeting, dining at Queens' College along with WBro. Jonathan Price (Caius Lodge) and the Provincial Grand Membership Officer, WBro. Ed Williams.

"Promoting closer ties between all of our Lodges in the Province of Cambridgeshire is of vital importance to both attract new members and to look after our existing ones. To extend our ties further to the wider College Lodges will see the Province continue to thrive. We look forward to cementing these bonds and developing meaningful relationships moving forward," said WBro. Williams.

#### Understand the symbolism of the Tyler's knocks

When a candidate seeks admission into a Lodge he is challenged by the Tyler, who is outside the door to the Lodge. The door of the Lodge is of great significance, as its outer side faces the profane world and its inner side the sacred world of the Lodge. So when we pass through it, we hope we change for the better and achieve spiritual growth.

When the Tyler has proven the person wishing to gain entry he gives three knocks on the door to the Lodge.



The knocks themselves are symbolic, although there is not always agreement in their symbolism. The one most often quoted is and taken from Matthew VII:VII.

Knock One: Ask and it will be given to you – asking the question 'What is Freemasonry' the answer to which can only be given by a Freemason.

Knock Two: Seek and you shall find. - seeking personal development in "a society of men who prize honour and virtue above the external advantages of rank and fortune".

Knock Three: Knock and it will be opened to you – once you have started on your journey you are led into the Lodge to start your journey in blind faith; faith in your beliefs and faith in your guides to lead you safely through that journey.

There are some who suggest the three knocks are a reference to the Masonic virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity; the candidate who knocks for admission must have faith in God, and hope and charity in his heart.

#### Will you take the test?

The Province has arranged a Prostate Cancer Screening session at Cambridge Masonic Hall from 4pm-8pm on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2023. The cost is £10 per person (subsidised by Cambridgeshire Masons).

Statistics show that one in eight men will at some point have Prostate Cancer and early diagnosis is key to a successful outcome. After having the Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) test you may be asked to take further tests as PSA testing is a screening process and having a high PSA result may indicate an enlarged prostate or local prostate infection as well as Prostate Cancer.

Prostate Cancer survivor, WBro. Dave Sowman, of St Andrew Lodge No. 4087 said: "I am keen to encourage everyone, particularly men aged over 50 or with family history of cancer, to book in for a PSA test. My own positive test led to further tests and discussions with an Oncology Consultant. I underwent radiotherapy and now, after eight years, I am still free from cancer. 
#### Installation of a new Rose Croix Inspector General
