Trust hands out £26,500

Grants of up to £3,000 to a variety of good causes in the Province have been agreed by the City & University of Cambridge Masonic Charitable Trust.

Six lodges have so far taken advantage of the Trust's Matched Funding offer. Each lodge in the Province can apply for £250 if it opts to make a donation to a local good cause.

To the retiring wardens, WBros. Danny Ellis and John McCormick, the Second Provincial Grand Principal, Excellent Companion David Blair and the other retiring officers, thank you so much for your service in the last year particularly representing or supporting me at Lodge Installations or Chapter Convocations.

Brethren, we took so much of our freemasonry for granted before it was suspended, and I know that in recent weeks it has been hard for many of us. We are finding new ways of keeping the spirit alive, communicating and engaging together so that when we do

resume we shall thrive again – a prospect I fear, sadly may not be true for many businesses especially on our High Streets, and in the hospitality trades.

On the charitable front Freemasonry always excels – it is in some ways the lifeblood coursing through all our veins. MCF has already allocated £1million pounds for Covid 19 causes and is raising a further £2million. From this Cambridgeshire has received two awards for a hospital scrubs initiative and also for syringe drivers for the Arthur Rank hospice. Additionally, we have also obtained matched funding for MAGPAS and the East Anglian Air Ambulance as well as small grant for council educational support packages for poor or deprived children who have limited facilities now the schools are closed.

Some of this has been or will be reported in the press and media and we continue to engage actively with them, but I firmly believe that our first priority is doing the right thing. This is what gets recognised best in the long run.

Mike Hinton who assumed the role of Communications Officer has had a challenging end to his first year as the Executive uses all the media options including Zoom, our Provincial Website and the Second Rising. UGLE has just issued its inaugural First Rising tempting me to suggest that where Cambridgeshire leads others may follow.



I am so grateful to Mike and his team. Leveraging social media can be so rewarding whilst being an important way of engaging with the younger members of society and I must mention the Light Blues Club in this regard under the leadership of Ed Williams. They have stepped up so well to assist in many ways in the last few months since lockdown.

We now have membership officers in almost all our lodges, and they have a hugely important and responsible role at the moment. Brethren, we cannot be complacent – it is at times like these when people re-evaluate

their personal budgets and priorities. Retaining contact with all our members and then encouraging them to return when we resume is so important. Ian Hardman the Provincial Membership Officer, and the Provincial Mentor Jon West, are bringing enthusiasm, new ideas and methods, but they will need all our support when we return especially as we re-engage with candidates and encourage others to join.

Which ceremonies we can practise and when is for the future but ensuring those ceremonies remain attractive, enjoyable and, importantly, with sensible meeting timings and length will remain one of our biggest challenges if we are to encourage brethren, old and new alike. It is at times like this when we both value and miss our brethren and friends. I have not as yet suggested a regular 9.00 o'clock toast BUT perhaps it might be an appropriate for us all to raise a glass to remember old friends and absent brethren at 9.00pm this evening. Brethren, I shall be doing it – will you join me?

We should also take time to remember those members of Cambridgeshire Provincial Grand Lodge, listed below, whom we have lost since last June. They too have played their part in the history of their lodges as well as in that of our province and we should remember them especially at 9.00 this evening.



Help for food banks - national and local

Freemasons in Cambridgeshire and across the country have provided 120,000 people with donations of 300,000 meals and 38 tonnes of food during the Covid-19 pandemic.

This includes the scheme run in Caldecote by WBro. Adrian Peters of Thirkill Lodge (pictured below), which was reported in a previous edition and in local press.



A food bank in March has benefitted from a donation of £500 from the town's Stone Cross Lodge No. 6704. Worshipful Master, WBro. Nigel Philpott, and Charity Steward, WBro. Paul Ashby, handed over the cheque to co-ordinator Mrs Barbara Taylor.

The donation includes £250 matched funding from the City & University of Cambridge Masonic Charitable Trust.

"We shall use the money locally to support families and individuals in need during this difficult time," said Barbara.

More than 120,000 people have been helped by Freemasons with a variety of food donation initiatives across England and Wales.



Homeless people, women's refuges and vulnerable people have been provided with assistance, and more than £560k has already been donated to provide meals and help numerous foodbanks during the pandemic.

The United Grand Lodge of England's Covid-19 Response Group supports those in need and identifies food banks and vulnerable people in need of help and galvanised its network to provide food donations, deliveries, and cook fresh meals

Wisbech support for blood bikes

A team of volunteer bikers who helping local hospitals has received a £750 donation from Wisbech's Gild of Holy Trinity Lodge No. 6125. Bro. Martin Calvert, a member of the Gild of Holy Trinity Lodge, received a cheque for £750, which included £250 match funding from the City & University of Cambridge Masonic Charitable Trust, from WBro. Martin Holmes, the Lodge's Charity Steward.

Norfolk Blood Bikes deliver blood, platelets, plasma, medical notes and equipment, donated breast milk and now Covid-19 samples for testing, from hospitals across Cambridgeshire and the surrounding area including Addenbrookes, North Cambs Hospital in Wisbech and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in King's Lynn.



Bro. Calvert is one of a team of volunteer riders who regularly workshifts from 7pm to 7am during the week and at weekends, helping to keep the charity's eight bikes and two cars on the road.

Commenting on the donation, he said that it was extremely welcome at a time when, due to the pandemic, a lot of Norfolk Blood Bikes' fundraising activities had been curtailed.

Magpas Air Ambulance has attended over 60,000 patients since it was founded in 1971. It needs an extra £50,000 a month to keep flying.

Lucy Chapman, Magpas Air Ambulance Director of Fundraising, said:

"We're very grateful to Cambridgeshire Freemasons for their generous grant.

This personal protective equipment is essential to keep our air ambulance crew flying during the coronavirus emergency. We'll be able to carry on providing life-saving treatment to local people while keeping our team safe and protected."







Two Grand Stewards from Cambridgeshire

Two Cambridgeshire brethren have been honoured by the Most Worshipful The Grand Master HRH The Duke of Kent, by becoming Grand Stewards.

In accordance with established tradition, Rule 36(a) in the Book Of Constitutions states that "Upon the annual installation of the Grand Master, he shall appoint nineteen Grand Stewards, and for this purpose one Brother shall be recommended annually to the Grand Master for appointment by each of the nineteen Lodges which enjoy the privilege of recommendation for that office."

Very unusually, two Cambridgeshire brethren - WBro. Mark Stollery from Isaac Newton Lodge No. 859 and WBro. Jonathan Lambert from Etheldreda Lodge No. 2107 - have been honoured this year with appointments to the rank of Grand Steward.

They assumed their appointments on the 29th April although they were not able to be formally invested by the Grand Master due to the lockdown.

WBro. Stollery is currently Worshipful Master of Old Union Lodge No. 46 and WBro. Lambert is currently Worshipful Master of The Lodge of Regularity No. 91 and both these lodges, along with 17 others, are known as the Red Apron Lodges and nominate a Grand Steward each year.

The primary role of the Grand Stewards is to organise the Grand Festival, held each year in April after the Grand Investiture, and to assist the Grand Director of Ceremonies in Grand Lodge.

At a subsequent meeting, held with the Grand Secretary and the Deputy Grand Secretary, the new Grand Stewards appoint a President, a Secretary and a Treasurer for the ensuing year. At the meeting, this year held on Zoom, WBro. Lambert was appointed as Secretary of the Board of Grand Stewards and is looking forward to the year ahead, despite issues caused by coronavirus.

Whatever this year brings for Mark and Jonathan they will forever be entitled to wear the distinctive red regalia and to take their places in the front rows of Grand Lodge, which are reserved for Past Grand Stewards.

Support for therapeutic horticulture

Nourse Lodge No. 8590 has donated £850 to The Prospects Trust to assist them with essential PPE in order to reopen the farm to their co-workers. The money was raised by WBro. Gordon Dunn and his wife Linda at the Lodge's Ladies Festival.

In thanking the Lodge, Rhian Cornell, executive officer of the Trust, based as Snakehall Farm, Cambridgeshire, said: We are in the process of writing risk assessments so we can safely open our gates to our co-workers and your donation will be used to help us do this - we are thinking of new hand and tool washing stations to minimise the risk of infection, new shelters in the field to give us safe social distancing groups and of course essential PPE.

The Prospect Trust is an 18-acre organic care farm in Cambridgeshire. The Trust specialises in providing therapeutic horticulture to people with learning difficulties, disabilities and those with varying health needs. It is a real farm providing work experience producing real organic products and produce.

Super-cyclone victims receive £15,000



Some of the thousands of people whose lives were devastated when Super-Cyclone Amphan hit Bangladesh and India in May will be given urgently needed humanitarian assistance, thanks to a grant of £15,000 from the Masonic Charitable Foundation.


More than 100 people died, despite a mass evacuation in advance, tens of thousands of homes were destroyed and power cut off in many regions. There was massive damage to roads, bridges and other essential infrastructure, and many villages were flooded or cut off.

There is a major shortage of food, and also drinking water supplies have been contaminated. The £15,000 is enough to provide more than 700 families with a comprehensive food basket that will last them up to 20 days in the wake of the disaster. This vital support ensures families will have access to basic necessities like rice, wheat flour, dal and high-energy biscuits.
